

## 1 Key Terminology

A study programme developed and/or provided jointly by two or more HEIs, possibly also in cooperation with other institutions, leading to the award of a double, multiple or joint degree.\*

> Erasmus+ \* Erasmus

> > Master

Joint Degree

- A single diploma (document) issued by at least two HEIs offering an integrated programme and recognised officially in the countries where the degreeawarding institutions are located
- Certifies the completion of one joint programme

Double Degree

- Two national diplomas issued by two HEIs and recognised officially in the countries where the degree-awarding institutions are located
- Certify the completion of one joint programme

Multiple Degree

- More than two national diplomas issued by more than two HEIs and recognised officially in the countries where the degree-awarding institutions are located
- Certify the completion of one joint programme



## 1b Double, joint, multiple degree – the Arqus situation

- All three types are allowed by legislation and in practise at the institutions
- Specific requirements may apply at some partners (i.e. U Graz: min. of 30 ECTS under jurisdiction of Graz to issue joint degree while other partners can co-sign a degree without having taught the student; U Vilnius: joint degree requires programme accreditation while double degree does not)
- there is a gap between pragmatic and strategic approach

double/multiple degree is perceived as easier to implement and manage; students value the "standard" format because employers are familiar with it



joint degree tends to be encouraged as institutional and political mission


#### 2 Motivation

- Sharing your uniqueness to profit from complementarity and foster excellence
- Include specific contents your institution cannot offer enlarge capacities
- Increase the overall attractiveness and quality of your educational offer
- Provide intercultural competences to students and increase structured mobility (students & staff) – Internationalisation at home/international classroom
- Facilitate further cooperation in research via in-depth knowledge
- Gain international visibility and reputation
- Reinforce international cooperation
- Increase student **recruitment** from a specific area
- Support employability by an enriched curriculum and an international degree
- Gain third-party funding access (Erasmus Mundus, national programmes)

## 3b Stand-alone programme or programme track – the Arqus situation

- Arqus partners offer both but vary in their reasoning/requirements
- Aspects to consider
  - → stand-alone programmes are **more visible**, better PR opportunities
  - → admission requirements are also more transparent for students
  - → programme tracks might be easier in terms of formal set-up and accreditation



## 3c JP according to study cycles – the Arqus situation

- Arqus partners are quite active in JP, may have several Erasmus Mundus implemented
- Most joint programmes are offered on master's level, bachelor's level is underrepresented
- JP on doctoral level are complex, most partners work with cotutelle de these
- Get in touch with your local contact early on (contact list at the end of the presentation)



## 5 Identifying partners

- Take trusted partners with whom you have been collaborating in exchange or projects
- Beware of partner requests coming in just before major funding deadlines
- Use Argus expertise and common grounds established since 2018
- Find further partners via these or through additional tools\*
